The Colours of the West Riding Battalion is paraded:

A Regimental representative:

I ask, on behalf of the Royal Yorkshire Regiment that you to take the Colours of the West Riding Battalion Territorials into the safe keeping of Huddersfield Parish Church.

The minister reads the following sentences:

"God has called you to a free life.... Use your freedom to serve one another in love; that's how freedom grows: Love others as you love yourself. This is an act of true freedom". Galatians 5

The minister continues:

We meet in the presence of God. We commit ourselves to work in penitence and faith for reconciliation between the nations that all people may together live in freedom, justice and peace. We pray for all who in bereavement, disability and pain continue to suffer the consequences of fighting and terror. We remember with thanksgiving and sorrow those whose lives, in world wars and conflicts past and present, have been given and taken away.






