The Central Chancery of the Orders of Knighthood has, at irregular intervals, notified for general information

the positioning of the wearing of Orders, decorations, and medals of the United Kingdom in the *London Gazette*. The *Order of Wear* was last published in 2019, to take into account newer medals and awards.

Order of Wearing

Order of wearing decorations and awards within the United Kingdoms Honours System.

The honours are split into the following several categories, in their order of precedence:

- Victoria Cross.
- George Cross.
- British Orders of Knighthood.
- Decorations, Medals for Gallantry and Distinguished Conduct.
- Badge of Honour.
- Campaign Medals and Stars.
- Polar Medals.
- Imperial Service Medal.
- Police Medals for Valuable Service.
- Jubilee, Coronation and Durbar Medals.
- Efficiency and Long Service Decorations and Medals.
- Commonwealth Realms' Orders, Decorations and Medals.
- Other Commonwealth Members' Orders, Decorations and Medals.
- Foreign Orders, Decorations and Medals.

NB: Several medals from the 1800's use the same ribbon from the Waterloo Medal.

Ribbons for various 'Orders,' such as The Order of the Bath, The Royal Victorian Order, Order of the British Empire, use the same ribbon, with the actual medal showing the Rank within the order – Knight/Lady/Dame, Grand Commander, Commander, Officer, Companion, Member.

The oldest Order of Medal is the **Most Noble Order of the Garter**, first awarded in May 1348. Instituted by King Edward III. Followed by:-

- Most Ancient and Most Noble Order of the Thistle May 1687, King James VII.
- Most Honourable Order of the Bath June 1725, King George I.
- Order of Merit - June 1902, King Edward VII.
- Most Distinguished Order of Saint Michael and Saint George April 1818, George Prince of Wales.
- **Distinguished Service Order** September 1816, Queen Victoria.
- **Royal Victorian order** April 1896, Queen Victoria.
- Imperial Service Order 1902, King Edward VII.
- Most Excellent Order of the British Empire June 1917, King George V.
- Order of the Companions of Honour June 1917, King George V.




World War I

During World War I (1914–1918) the following campaign medals were issued:



The most frequent combinations are "trios" of either the 1914 or 1914–15 Star, the British War Medal and Victory Medal; and "pairs" of the British War and Victory Medals, these generally for servicemen who joined the war after 1915. A Memorial Plaque was issued to the next-of-kin of deceased service personnel.
