Mossley: The Duke of Wellington's Regiment and the Great War

Men of Mossley and District commemorated on the 5 DWR War Memorial in Huddersfield Drill Hall

The contents for this booklet have been kindly donated to the Archives by Rita Vaughan and Kathryn Young, of Stalybridge, who have carried out some very detailed research on the men of Mossley, Carrbrook and Luzley who fell in the First World War.

An original booklet, by Rita, entitled Remember All the Boys, was donated to the Regiment in 2011. Since then an enhancement of the initial research has been undertaken and is also now available on the individual memorials to each man on the findagrave.com website. Kathryn has compiled the War Records that follow.

This extract from their work has now been added to the DWR Regimental electronic Archives for the 5th Battalion which adds to the knowledge of those commemorated on the Drill Hall War Memorial. It also complements the book published by the Drill Hall Trustees in 2019 - *Huddersfield Drill Hall War Memorial 1914-1921 (5th Battalion The Duke of Wellington's (West Riding Regiment))*, by Scott Flaving and Michael Green.

ABOUT REGIMENT

Leonard did not undergo his army medical examination until 28th November 1916 and he served at home until he was posted to France. Within three months he was killed in action.



The 2nd/5th Battalion of the Duke of Wellington's Regiment, were attached to the 186th (2/2nd West Riding) Brigade in the 62nd (2nd West Riding) Division. The Division were engaged in the 'First Battle of Bapaume' from 24th -25th March 1918. They were forced to retreat after the enemy onslaught and were dug in at Bucquoy, near Gommecourt, on 27th March 1918.

Killed in action.

EVENTS LEADING TO DEATH

After the enemy onslaught in the St Quentin area from 21st to 23rd March 1918, the front line was badly fragmented as the remnants of the divisions of the Fifth Army were fighting and moving in small bodies, often composed of men of different units. In the late evening of 24th March, after enduring unceasing shelling, Bapaume was evacuated and occupied by German forces the following day. The allied forces suffered heavy casualties over the two days of the 'First Battle of Bapaume'. Leonard survived the main battle but a letter from Leonard's superior officer advised his family he had been killed instantly, in action, on 27th March. The Mossley Reporter dated 13th April 1918 carried a short obituary dedicated to Leonard.

Leonard was originally buried close to where he fell. After the armistice, his body was reburied in this cemetery.

OTHER SUPPORTING FAMILY DOCUMENTATION NOT ALREADY COVERED ABOVE Leonard had a life-long connection with St John the Baptist Church and School in Roughtown, Mossley. Additional information regarding those buried in the family grave at plot 2548 in Mossley Cemetery:

- Father Charles was a Mossley Councillor and died locally.
- Mother Ellen, Sister Gertrude and Brother Gilbert all died at 229 Stockport Road, Mossley. The siblings never married.

Sisters Lilian, aged 19 and Ethel, aged 16, were living with their parents in Mossley in 1911. It is not known what became of them after that date due to the common surname.

Sister Beatrice was living with her siblings in Mossley in 1939. She was still unmarried in 1960, when her brother Gilbert died. It is not known what became of her after this date.

Brother William married Ada Warhurst in 1901, in a registrar attended wedding in Ashton-u-Lyne. Ada died on 4th March 1906 and he married widow Jane Ann Ormerod nee Barton, on 28th September 1909, at Albion Congregational Church in Ashton-Under-Lyne. William was living at 3 Brookfields, Mossley, when he died in Ashton Hospital, aged 63, on 29th July 1942. He is buried with his family at plot 2735 in Mossley Cemetery.

Brother Hereford married Elizabeth Shrigley in 1910, at St John the Baptist Church, Roughtown, Mossley. They emigrated to Ontario in Canada in 1915. Hereford may have have died there, aged 84, in 1970.



OTHER PROBATE RECORDS

Father Charles's probate was awarded to his two sons William and Gilbert, who were both Grocers and his unmarried daughter Gertrude.

Mother Ellen's probate was awarded to her unmarried daughter Gertrude.

Sister Gertrude's probate was awarded to her Grocer brother Gilbert and spinster sister Beatrice. Brother William's probate was awarded to his son Charles Edward, who was a Commissionaire and his married daughter Jane Ann Wilson.

Brother Gilbert's probate was awarded to his unmarried sister Beatrice.

William would have be involved in multiple operations during 1917. The Cambrai operation was a British attack, originally conceived as a very large scale raid, which employed new artillery techniques and massed tanks. Initially, it was very successful with large gains of ground made, but German reserves brought the advance to a halt. Ten days later, a counterattack regained much of the ground. Ultimately this was a disappointing and costly outcome.

INFORMATION ABOUT REGIMENT



The 2nd/5th Battalion of the Duke of Wellington's (West Riding Regiment) were formed at Huddersfield in October 1914. In March 1915, they were part of the 186th Brigade of the 62nd Division. In January 1917, they were mobilised for war and landed in France.

EVENTS LEADING TO DEATH

In December 1917, William's wife received a letter from Lieutenant E. R. Dunstan, it read, "Your husband was killed in action on November 27th whilst nobly doing his duty. During an attack on that day, your husband, who was a Lewis gunner under me, was getting his gun into action when he was shot through the head by a sniper, dying instantly and without pain. He was very good at his work, a most reliable soldier and a great loss to the company." William's last resting place is unknown. The Cambrai Memorial commemorates more than 7,000 servicemen of the United Kingdom and South Africa who died in the 'Battle of Cambrai' in November and December 1917 and whose graves are lost. The Mossley Reporter dated 22nd December 1917 carried William's obituary.

William had a life-long connection with Christ Church, Friezland in Greenfield. He was a talented trombone player and played in the Royal George Band Club for several years before he enlisted.
Wife Ada married Joel Heywood in 1922, at Christ Church, Friezland, Greenfield. He died in 1928 and she married for third time in 1941, at St John the Baptist Church, Roughtown, Mossley. Her third husband was John Wood. Ada died in Ashton or Mossley, aged 73, in 1962.

Son William married Nora Wood in 1938, in a registrar attended wedding in Ashton-u-Lyne. He died in the Oldham area, aged 63, in April 1981. He is buried with Nora's family at plot 3345A in Mossley cemetery. There is no headstone.

The following family members are buried in Christ Church Churchyard in Greenfield. There are no headstones and they may or may not be buried together:



- Father Norman. He died at Royal George, Greenfield, aged 31, in April 1890.
- Mother Esther. She died at Armit Cottages, Greenfield, aged 58, in September 1915.
- Sister Edith. She never married and died in July 1911, aged 29, at Armit Cottages, Greenfield.
- Brother Charles. He died aged 19 months.

Brother John married Mary Elizabeth Brown in 1905, at Christ Church, Friezland in Greenfield. He died at 3 Armit Road, Grasscroft, aged 67, on 11th June 1951.

Malcolm served at home from 17th March 1916 until 10th January 1917. His enlistment papers show he was living at his married sister Lena's home, at 3 Quick Edge Road, Mossley. Lena was also named as his next of kin, despite his father David still being alive and living at 51 Lorne Street, Mossley. After the huge number of casualties in 1916, some of the 'home' services were sent to support

the front line. As a consequence, Malcolm's Battalion embarked at Southampton on 11th January 1917 and landed at Le Havre the following day.

INFORMATION ABOUT REGIMENT

The 2nd/5th Battalion of the Duke of Wellington's (West Riding Regiment) were formed in Halifax in September 1914 as a home service ('second line') unit. They came under the orders of the 186th Brigade, in the 62nd (2nd West Riding) Division. They landed in France in January 1917.

EVENTS LEADING TO DEATH

After landing in France, Malcolm marched with his Battalion to Bus-le-Artois. The weather was so cold that the ink in fountain pens and the rifle oil in the Lewis guns froze. The men were given training in trenches and on 13th February they marched to Berm Work, near Beaumont Hamel, where they entered the trenches, relieving the 1st Battalion of the Dorsetshire Regiment, in front of Serre. Much of these trenches had been blown in, meaning their first task was to set about repairing them. Malcolm lost his life the following day, although some records record his date of death as 15th February 1917, he had been in France for just over a month. He may have died in one of the Casualty Clearing Stations close to Auchonvillers, most of the burials in this cemetery came from these units.

Malcolm was the first cousin, (their mothers were sisters), of James Henry Taylor, who was killed in action in Mesopotamia, aged 31, on 25th April 1916, while serving with the Prince of Wales's Volunteers (South Lancashire Regiment). He has no known grave. Malcolm was a member of Micklehurst Conservative Club and for many years was a chorister at All Saints Church in Micklehurst. The Mossley Reporter carried his obituary in the first week of March 1917. Wife Maggie died in Mossley, aged 22, in February 1912. She is buried alone in plot 1248 in Mossley Cemetery. There is no headstone.

Father David died in Mossley, aged 64, in October 1924. He is buried at plot 1329 in Mossley Cemetery. There is no headstone.

Mother Frances gave birth to Hannah Mary, who died shortly after her birth in 1874. Frances was only around 16 years of age and unmarried. She died in Mossley, aged 52, in July 1911 and is buried with Malcolm's father in Mossley Cemetery.

Martha Andrews who died in Mossley, aged 79, in 1909, was the first burial in plot 1329 in Mossley Cemetery. It is not known if, or how she is related to the Schofield family. Sister Lena married William Green on 3rd September 1904, at St James's Church, Millbrook, Stalybridge. She was living at 57 Lorne Street, Mossley when she died in Ashton Hospital, aged 79, on 16th September 1959.

Sister Agnes moved to the USA where she married a Mossley man, Herbert Taylor, in 1910, in New Bedford, Massachusetts. They returned to England in 1911 and their two children were born in Mossley. They returned to the USA in 1914 where Agnes died. Herbert returned to England and enlisted for war service. He later died of wounds, aged 35, while serving with the Northumberland Fusiliers on 15th April 1918. He is buried in Belgium.

Sister Florence married Thomas Wood on 8th May 1926, at St George's Church, Mossley. It is not known what happened to her due to the common surname.

In 1917, Walter's Battalion were involved in the Arras campaign, which featured the notorious 'Battle of Bullecourt'. Later there were attacks on the Hindenburg Line, before they took part in the Cambrai Operations. Walter's service record has not survived and therefore, his precise movements are unknown.

EVENTS LEADING TO DEATH

On the day Walter died, his Battalion experienced severe fighting at Chateau Wood. They captured 353 prisoners, 15 machine guns and a trench mortar. They suffered casualties amounting to around 10 killed, 55 wounded and 4 men were missing. Walter was among the dead. The Cambrai Memorial commemorates more than 7,000 servicemen of the United Kingdom and South Africa, who died in the Battle of Cambrai in November and December 1917, whose graves are not known. The Mossley Reporter dated 15th December 1917 carried Walter's obituary.

Wife Esther died in Mossley, aged 64, in 1941. She is buried in Grave 5, Range 5 in the 1938 ground of St George's Churchyard in Mossley. There is no headstone. Esther was the sister of Harold Brierley, who was killed in action aged 23, on 3rd May 1918, while serving with the Duke of Wellington's (West Riding Regiment). He is buried in France.

Daughter Edith married Patrick Leech in 1919, in a registrar attended wedding in Ashton-u-Lyne. She died in Mossley, aged 31, in 1928. She is buried with her baby cousin Mary Sutcliffe, at plot 1305 in Mossley Cemetery. There is no headstone.

Daughter Olive married George Frost on 18th September 1920, at St George's Church in Mossley. She died in Blackpool, aged 92, in 1992.

Daughter Phyllis married John Redvers Henry Whitehead on 15th May 1928, at St George's Church in Mossley. She died in Whitehaven, Cumbria, aged 72, in 1977.

Daughter Gertrude married Jack Fowler in 1936, at St George's Church in Mossley. In 1939, the couple were living with Gertrude's mother in Mossley. Gertrude died in Blackpool, aged 67, in 1981.

Son John who died aged 2 months and daughter Annie who died aged 9 months are buried in St George's Churchyard in Mossley. The burial book does not state their plot numbers.

Father Robert died in Stalybridge, aged 76, in February 1927.

Mother Elizabeth died in Stalybridge, aged 72, in May 1926. Both Walter's parents are buried in St Paul's Churchyard in Stalybridge. This cemetery has been grassed over.

Sister Gertrude married William Sutcliffe on 22nd May 1909, at New St George's Church in Stalybridge. She died in Dukinfield, aged 84, in 1967.

Brother Albert was single and serving in the Royal Navy in 1911. He died in Stalybridge, aged 68, in June 1949. He is also buried in St Paul's Churchyard in Stalybridge. It is not known for certain known whether Albert married.

Half-brother Thomas was born with the surname 'Binns', two years before his mother married. He appeared on the censuses as 'Shepherd' but reverted to his birth name in adulthood. He married Eliza Ann Baxter on 26th February 1898, at St James's Church, Millbrook, Stalybridge. Eliza died in 1907 and he married widow Elizabeth Marsden nee Seymour in 1916, at Albion United Reformed Church in Ashton-u-Lyne. The couple were already living together in 1911. He died in Ashton-u-Lyne, aged 73, in 1946.

Bernard was 5'3" and weighed just 8st 13lb when he enlisted. He was originally assigned to the 1st/6th Battalion of the Duke of Wellington's (West Riding Regiment). His address at the time was 16 Higher Springfield, Roughtown, Mossley. Bernard's service in France lasted just 35 days.




The 1st/5th Battalion of the Duke of Wellington's (West Riding Regiment), were from the Huddersfield area which included Holmfirth. They were part of 147th (2nd West Riding) Infantry Brigade in the 49th West Riding Division. They served in France and Belgium.

He was dangerously ill on 3rd September and died in hospital in Rouen, three days later. His mother received a letter from him, reminding her of his upcoming birthday, on the same day as she received the telegram, saying he had been seriously wounded. Three days later, she received another telegram confirming that he had died from his injuries. The Rouen hospital was a large facility and received its casualties via the nearby railway line. It was a safe distance from the front line and with its transport links, the town became a major logistics centre throughout WW1.

Bernard was a devout Catholic and attended St Joseph's Church in Mossley. He was also a member of the local Yorkshire Ward Liberal Club. He was the first cousin (their mothers were sisters), of Wilson Haigh, who died in the same action, aged 26, on 3rd September 1916, while serving with the Duke of Wellington's (West Riding Regiment). He has no known grave. The Mossley Reporter carried Bernard's obituary on 16th September 1916, it also reported that Bernard had eight cousins and two uncles on active service. One of these uncles was Albert McGuinness, of the Royal Flying Corps, who drowned, aged 40, when the troopship 'Osmaniah', hit a mine in the sea near Egypt, on 31st December 1917. He is buried in Egypt.

There is an unmarked family grave at plot 3132 in Mossley Cemetery which contains the following family members: -

- Father John. He died in Ashton Town, aged 38, in November 1908.
- Mother Jane. She supported her family by working as a Charwoman after Bernard's father died. She married David Barnes in 1911, in a registrar attended wedding in Ashton-u-Lyne and they had a son, Thomas, in 1912. Jane died in Mossley, aged 67, in May 1941.
- > Stepfather David. He served in the armed forces in WW1 and was wounded twice. He died in Mossley, aged 65, in April 1948.
- Sister Ellen. She died in Mossley, aged 24, in September 1923. She never married.
- Sister Mary. She died locally, aged 68, in April 1972. She never married.

Sister Catherine. She died at 33 Waterton Lane, Mossley, aged 67, on 21st September 1974. She never married.

Brothers James, who died aged fifteen weeks and Stephen, who died aged one month, are buried with nine members of the extended family, at unmarked plot 3088, in Mossley cemetery.

It is not known for certain what became of brother John or halfbrother Thomas Barnes due to the large number of similarly named records.
